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What does the Lafayette Historic Preservation Board do?

The Lafayette Historic Preservation Board (HPB) is a group of volunteers appointed by City Council to assist the City in its endeavor to commemorate Lafayette's history through the preservation of notable properties. The HPB reviews and recommends for landmarking historic resources within the city. The HPB also reviews plans for any alterations to landmarked sites, and through public outreach, promotes historic preservation and the history of Lafayette.
